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

The Branch Board of Director's annual budget is presented for approval at the annual meeting.

In 2017-2018, Branch revenue was \$516,927, expenses were \$459,963, and there was a surplus of \$56,964. As of April 30, 2019 the 2018-19 revenues were \$428,364 and expenses were \$306,506. Total Branch assets as of April 30, 2019 are \$758,509 of which \$740,294 is Cash and Investments and \$13,508 are Capital Assets.



The Branch began activities by welcoming students back to studies at our annual Welcome Reception on September 27 at the College of Law. The Mentorship Program that matches students with volunteer lawyers was launched at a Mentorship Match Reception on October 16 and this year over 50 successful matches were made.

Collaborating with the College of Law Career Office, the Branch coordinated another successful Saskatchewan Law Firm Showcase on November 7. Thank you to our volunteers who agreed to present on career topics to the students, and to the many firms and organizations who participated in the Showcase itself. The students appreciated the information and networking opportunities.

#### **LEGISLATION AND LAW REFORM**

#### CHARMAINE PANKO

It has been my privilege to step into the role of the Legislation and Law Reform Director. This portfolio provides the unique opportunity for a behind the scenes glimpse of our always evolving legal landscape and to engage with CBA members to receive and pass along their wise input and suggestions in many diverse areas of the law.

For those of you who may be curious, any requests for feedback on an issue directly relate to Saskatchewan is sent to the appropriate CBA section chairs and/or distributed to the membership at large so that member feedback can be collected and then forwarded. On occasion our Branch is asked to provide feedback on possible interventions by the CBA. This spring our Branch supported CBA Intervention in the Canadian National Railway Co v. BNSF Railway Co. Federal Appeal case. The Branch was also pleased to provide comments on the National CBA Policy Committee's proposal that the Supreme Court of Canada occasionally hold hearings outside of Ottawa.

The fall kicked off with a request for concerns, comments and feedback on issues of importance to CBA members who appear before the Federal Courts. The Law Reform Commission of Saskatchewan was next to request that our members be informed about the Commission's consultation paper Tentative Proposals for a Land Charges Act, part of the Commission's project on real property security law in Saskatchewan. This spring the Commission also requested comments on their consultation report on the need for life lease legislation in Saskatchewan.

On behalf of the Board, the now Justice Neil Robertson, Q.C., drafted a significant submission to the Justices of the Peace Compensation Commission. In addition to meeting individually with a number of folks to better understand the issues, the preparation of this submission involved reviewing the Hood Commission Report from 2014, the 2017 Provincial Court Compensation Report, the Government of Saskatchewan's submission (82 pages) and the Justices of the Peace Association submission (127 pages).

The Saskatchewan Ministry of Justice began its work in preparing Regulations to accompany Bills 97 and 98 which were passed by the Legislative Assembly in the spring of 2018, and asked for our members' participation in the Early Dispute Resolution Regulations Consultation. The Ministry also sought comments on recommendations made by the Law Reform Commission of Saskatchewan regarding Regulations to accompany The Intestate Succession Act, 2019 which passed third reading in March.

The Minister of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety asked for feedback on proposed amendments to The Occupational Health and Safety Regulations, 1996. In March 2019, Bill 154, The Intestate Succession Act, 2019 passed third reading.

And most recently, the Branch received an invitation from the Courts to provide feedback on the topic of cameras in the courtroom.

In reviewing the year and various issues of importance to our profession that our feedback is sought after, it is evident that as a CBA member your opinion matters!

#### **PUBLIC OUTREACH**

In celebration of the signing of Canada's Charter of Rights and Freedoms CBA Saskatchewan Branch has several events for the public and students to learn about the law, the legal profession and the legal institutions that form the cornerstones of Canadian democracy.

On April 3 Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy and CBA Saskatchewan Branch hosted a public lecture Medical Assistance in Dying: Legal and Medical Realities in Regina. Lawyers and members of the public attended this lecture presented by Bryan Salte, Associate Registrar, College of Physicians and Surgeons and Dr. Robert Weiler, College of Medicine, University of Saskatchewan and Amy Zaraeczny, Associate Professor, Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy.

On April 13, high school teams from Melville, Regina, Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Yorkton participated in the Mock Trial Competition at the Court of Queen's Bench in Saskatoon. Students, teachers and legal advisors spent countless hours preparing for the Mock Trial and learned valuable information about our legal institutions. The students participated in a round robin tournament in which they took on the role of Prosecution, Defence and Witness in a murder/manslaughter trial. Individual awards were given out for best opening statement, direct examination, cross examination, closing statement and best witness performance. With the assistance of Justice R. S. Smith, Justice R. Elson and Justice D. Wilson, Judge P. Reis, Judge M. Martinez and Judge E. Kalenith, the Yorkton Regional High School Team 2 took home the McKercher Cup after a long day of competition. The CBA Saskatchewan branch would like to thank all volunteers and participants for their assistance in making this event a huge success.

On April 24th and 25th, volunteer CBA member lawyers in conjunction with Pro Bono Law Saskatchewan provided a free phone clinic to members of the public on various legal issues. Members of the public expressed gratitude for the opportunity and volunteers spoke of the positiveness of the interactions. Thank you to all practitioners who volunteered their time to provide legal advise to members of the public who do not otherwise have access to counsel. Also throughout the year, volunteer CBA members visited classrooms across Saskatchewan talking about the profession, the law and answering student questions. Every year this program continues to grow and allows students to learn about our profession.

Thank you to our Law Day Committee: Tom Baldry, Joni MacKay, Q.C., Andrea Phillips, Demi Panko, Bonnie Reddekopp, Talon Regent, Neil Robertson, Q.C. and Monteen Dent. 

#### **RESOLUTIONS, CONSTITUTION & BYLAWS**

The Branch Council, at its meeting of January 31, 2019, amended the Bylaws of the Branch. In accordance with Bylaw 24, a Resolution to approve the amendments to the Bylaws will be put forward at the Annual Meeting of the Branch to be held on June 13, 2019. A blacklined version of the Amended Bylaws accompanied the Notice of the Annual Meeting.

Reché McKeague presented to Council at its said meeting the proposed Bylaw Amendments that had been drafted with the assistance of this Chair. The Amendments include revisions to Section governance and to recognize that the Branch sections shall operate in compliance with the Association's Sections Regulation Part A and with the section terms of reference and the bylaws, regulations, policies and procedures adopted by the Branch. The Bylaw Amendments also included a provision permitting the Branch Board of Directors to propose the adoption, amendment, or rescission of Bylaws, which proposals will not come into force until approved at the Annual Meeting of the Branch. The Amendments also included various housekeeping items.

Other than the Resolution of the Branch Council to amend the Bylaws, there were no other Resolutions made by the Branch Council since the last Annual Meeting of the Branch, other than customary motions approving the Branch budget and Council Meeting agendas and minutes.

This Committee greatly appreciates the very considerable work of Reché McKeague and Monteen Dent concerning the Amendments to the Bylaws.

#### MID-WINTER MEETING COMMITTEE

On January 31 and February 1, 2019 lawyers from across Saskatchewan gathered in Saskatoon for the CBASK Mid-Winter Meeting themed "Enhancing Justice." With sessions on substantive legal matters, the legal profession itself and topics pertaining to greater societal issues and the impact on the law and lawyers 2019's theme was very aptly titled.

The meeting opened Thursday morning with an informative update from Justice Minister Don Morgan, Q.C. During the opening plenary, Mr. Justice Arnot, Chief Commissioner of the Saskatchewan Human Rights Commission spoke about the reforms within his organization and how they are positively impacting our province with a goal to eliminate systematic discrimination. Justice Arnot provided concrete examples of how the SHRC is positively impacting the lives of the people of Saskatchewan.

The President's Forum was held Friday morning and was led by Ontario criminal lawyer and legal commentator, Angela Chaisson. Ms. Chaisson led a call to arms for lawyers to do better with respect to engaging and supporting women and minorities within our practices. The closing plenary/St. Thomas More College John Stack Lecture was a sobering presentation by Howard Sapers, an expert on prison reform. He provided a case study on the use of imprisonment as punishment by reviewing the practical and ethical considerations of our system.

The CPD sessions were varied, allowing attendees to hear presentations on criminal law, family law, contract law, employment law, estate litigation, advocacy and more. There were four concurrent educational streams. The goal of the planning committee was to ensure that each time slot contained four disparate topics so that attendees could find something of interest at each of the CPD sessions. Participants benefited from sessions led by Chief Justice Popescul, Justice Megaw, Dr. Keith Carlson (Research Chair in Aboriginal and Community Engaged History, UofS), Raymond Adlington (CBA National President), Dean Martin Phillipson and many other distinguished practitioners. Thank you to all those who led our CPD!

Troy Baril did an excellent job planning this year's Thursday Night Social Event for the Mid-Winter Meeting. Attendees were able to catch up with colleagues while enjoying craft beer, delicious appetizers and a live performance by The Barrelmen. Almost all in attendance supported the 50/50 draw with the proceeds supporting CLASSIC.



#### SASKATCHEWAN UPDATE AND NEW DEVELOPMENTS:

Saskatchewan has come some way in the development and use of ADR, particularly in its court system. Noteworthy are the mandatory mediation aspects of the same. In any civil case, there must be a mandatory mediation held prior to document production. This mediation takes place with the Alternative Dispute Office of the Ministry of Justice and is completed by a government appointed mediator.

In both family and civil cases, a judicial mediation or a Pre-Trial Conference must take place prior to any trial being held.

New bills are in the works, which will alter the family law litigation process to also include mandatory mediation. ADR legal professionals are anxiously waiting to see what sort of requirements will be put into place in this front.

Collaborative Law has begun to adapt in Saskatchewan and involve the use of other professionals. As such, the Collaborative Lawyers group has rebranded and is now the Collaborative Professionals of Saskatchewan Inc.



#### 1 Summary of significant accounting policies

#### Nature of organization

The Provincial Council of the Saskatchewan Branch of the Canadian Bar Association is the governing body of the provincial organization which has the duty to carry on the work of the Branch and advance the objects of the Canadian Bar Association at the provincial level.

The objective of the Canadian Bar Association, Saskatchewan Branch (the CBA, SK Branch) is to serve as an advocate for all members of the legal profession.

The CBA, SK Branch is exempt from income tax under Section 149 of the Income Tax Act.

#### **Basis of accounting**

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not for profit organizations (ASNPO).

#### Cash

Cash consists of cash on hand, balances with banks and investments which mature within three months of the date of acquisition and are held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments.

#### Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost. Amortization is provided over the assets' estimated useful lives using the straight line method and the following rates:

Office equipment	15 years
Computer hardware	5 years
Computer software	3 years
Artwork	N/A

In the year of acquisition, amortization is recorded at one-half of the annual rate. Artwork is protected and preserved and is not amortized.

#### 1 Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

#### **Financial instruments**

Financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, investments, and accounts payable. Investments consist of term deposits, guaranteed investment certificates and fixed income bonds.

These financial instruments are initially recorded at fair value and subsequently measured at amortized cost. Amortization is recorded on a straight-line basis.

Financial assets are tested for impairment at the end of each reporting period when there are indications that an asset may be impaired.

#### Revenue recognition

The association uses the deferral method of accounting for contributions whereby restricted contributions related to expenses of future periods are deferred and recognized as revenue in the period in which the related expenses are incurred. All other contributions are recognized as revenue in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

The association accounts for membership fees, organization's program delivery, administrative activities associated with general membership, and luncheon activities of the CBA, SK Branch.

Revenue sources received in advance are deferred and recorded as revenue in the period to which they relate.

#### Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with ASNPO requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future.

#### Contributed materials and services

Contribution of materials and services are recognized both as contributions and expenses in the statement of operations only when a fair value can be reasonably estimated and when the materials are used in the normal course of the association's operations and would otherwise have been purchased. The amount of contributed materials and services recognized in the financial statements is nil (2017 - nil).

#### 6 Financial instruments

#### Credit risk

#### Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the association will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they become due. Liquidity risk also includes the risk of not being able to liquidate assets in a timely manner at a reasonable price. The association's approach to managing liquidity is to ensure, as far as possible, that it will always have sufficient cash flows to fund its operations and to meet its liabilities when due, under both normal and stressed conditions.

#### Other risks

The association does not consider itself to have significant exposure to currency risk, market risk, or other price risk.
